 - The elevator will go up to the top floor.
- 2. Go down: To decrease or be accepted.

- 3. Go away: To leave or disappear.
 - We usually go away for the summer.
 - The smell went away when he opened the window.
- 4.Go out: To leave home for social activities.
 - Let's go out for dinner tonight and try that new restaurant.
 - They often go out with friends on weekends.
- 5. Go for: To choose or aim for.
 - I'll go for the pasta; it's my favourite dish.
 - She decided to go for the job that offered more opportunities.

- 6. Go through: To experience or examine carefully.
 - She had to go through a difficult time after losing her job.
 - Before signing any contract, it's essential to go through the terms and conditions.
- 7. Go on: To continue or proceed.
 - Please go on with your story; I'm interested in hearing more.
 - I can't believe what's going on in the world right now; it's so unpredictable.
- 8. Go without: To lack or not have something.
 - I can't go without my morning coffee; it's a daily ritual.
 - During the camping trip, we had to go without electricity.
- 9. Go around: To circulate or spread
 - There won't be enough pizza to go around if you take two pieces.
 - Be cautious; there's a flu bug going around the office.
- 10. Go off: To explode or make a loud noise.
 - The fireworks will go off at midnight to celebrate the New Year.
 - Please check why the alarm went off; there might be an issue.
- 11. Go on about: To talk continuously or at length about something.
 - He can go on about his travel experiences for hours; it's fascinating.
 - Sorry, I didn't mean to go on about my problems for so long.

12. Go ahead: To proceed or start.

- If you're ready, you can go ahead and begin the presentation.
- Go ahead and open the package; I'm curious to see what's inside.

13. Go after: To pursue or chase.

- He decided to go after his dream of becoming a professional musician.
- The police went after him but he got away.

14. Go against: To oppose or disagree with something or someone.

- What you're asking me to do goes against everything I believe in.
- It's not easy to go against the majority opinion, but sometimes it's necessary to stand up for what you believe in.

15. Go by: To move past.

- Time seems to go by quickly when you're having fun.
- Don't let opportunities go by

16. Go over: To review or examine.

- Let's go over the details of the contract before signing.
- I need to go over my notes before the exam.

17. Go along: To accompany or cooperate.

- Would you like someone to go along with you to the event?
- The two companies decided to go along with the merger.

- 18. Go back to: To have existed since a time in the past.
 - Our relationship goes back to when we were at college together.
 - Alex and I go back years. I've known her since kindergarten.
- 19. Go about: To approach or undertake a task.
 - There are different ways to go about learning a new language; find what works best for you.
 - The team discussed how to go about the project.
- 20. Go under: To sink or to fail.
 - The ship went under just minutes after the last passenger had been rescued.
 - Nothing could be done to keep the company from going under.
